As we come together to celebrate the 65th anniversary of the Student Nurses' Association of Pennsylvania, it is time to reflect on the impact that SNAP has made on nursing and education. For 65 years, SNAP has and will continue to be the leading voice for nursing students across the commonwealth. SNAP has been at the forefront advocating for nursing students' rights, a voice at the table with nursing and healthcare leaders, and developing partnerships to benefit the educational and professional pursuits of its members.

In her 2002 address at the 50th Anniversary Celebration, Betty Hilton-Martin, SNAP and NSNA's first president, described SNAP's formation which she pioneered in these words: "What began as little groups in student rooms, then in lounges, then in student government meetings, then in districts, then in states, and ultimately on a national level – has amazing progressed to what we see here today!" Her words clearly depict how far we have come over the last 65 years with a membership of over 5,000 student nurses and nearly 70 local chapters. We no longer meet in student rooms or lounges, but we must appreciate our humble beginnings that created one of the most successful state association in NSNA. Betty also reminds us about our roots and why we exist. SNAP was established to represent nursing students, preserve and protect

Legislative Coordinator Year-End Report

Hello, SNAP members! This year went by so quickly, and I am happy to say that SNAP accomplished many feats within the year in terms of legislation. All thirteen resolutions presented at the 2016 State Convention were adopted. Many of these resolutions were presented to and adopted by the NSNA at the Annual Convention in Dallas, TX this past April, including the resolution I presented on behalf of Pennsylvania.



I am also pleased to report that <u>all</u> resolve statements from <u>all</u> resolutions passed at the state level were implemented as specified by the authors. This is an accomplishment that has not been done to this extent before. The implementation of the resolutions opened the door for change, and communication between SNAP and multiple professional organizations has flourished.

Interest in writing resolutions and the legislative process has grown significantly. Many SNAP members attended the David R. Ranck LEAD Workshop in March and were inspired to take action on things you are passionate about in nursing. Cindy Schmus's presentation on the purpose of writing a resolution was excellent and extremely educational. Other members attended Capitol Hill Step-By-Step Day in March, where we heard from David R. Ranck, SNAP professional consultant and parliamentarian; Elizabeth Long, former SNAP and NSNA Board Member; Dr. Karen Murphy, Pennsylvania Secretary of

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Health; and Sarah Galbally, Pennsylvania Secretary of Policy and Planning. These speakers instilled in listeners a feeling of hopefulness. Nurses have the ability and responsibility to act to preserve and protect the good many in our society, and we can do so even as students.

This year, a lot of Policy and Bylaw changes occurred as well. I reviewed and edited SNAP's Policy Manual in January. In June, I presented to the Board three new Policies and two proposed Bylaw amendments that I authored. In September, another Policy and Bylaw proposed amendment were made. Therefore, at the State Annual Convention, the SNAP Board of Directors will present four Policy changes that we adopted as well as three proposed Bylaw amendments that the House of Delegates will vote on. This is an exciting process, and it will serve to make the necessary changes to our organization to improve its functioning.

It is difficult to express just how honored I am to have served as your Legislative Coordinator this past year. I feel as if I have grown as a leader and discovered what lies in store for me in my future career. All of you are the reason for this. Although I served as a leader, you are all the backbone of this organization, and you are the true reason this organization is so strong and wonderful.

I look forward to seeing you all at Convention, if you can attend. I especially look forward to reviewing all resolutions submitted, as they are the testament of the hard work and passionate for change that you emulate. If there is anything that I can ever do for you, please never hesitate to contact me. I hope that we all continue to seek out our passions and work to progress our profession forward together.

Legislative Committee Year End Report

The Legislative Committee, consisting of Meghan Scanlon, Chair, Jenna Kessler and Holly Storm, worked extremely hard this past year to accomplish an ambitious goal that we set in November of 2016. As a committee, we made the promise to enact every resolved statement in all thirteen resolutions passed at the 2016 Annual State Convention. This feat has not been accomplished in many years due to the magnitude of the task itself. However, we saw the importance of enacting the resolves to facilitate the changes authors saw fit for SNAP and the nursing profession.

To enact the resolve statements, we divided the work among ourselves as a committee. We sent the resolutions to all organizations specified in the resolutions. We also personally authored articles in Insight and SNAP-To-It to increase awareness and education of the resolution topics, as specified in most resolutions' resolve statements. Many of the organizations we contacted replied with words of support, and they expressed their admiration that students are proactive in acting for change they see necessary.

Overall, it was a successful year for the Legislative Committee, and we hope that future legislative committees strive to accomplish the same tasks. By doing so, the legislation SNAP adopts can be put into real practice, just as it should be. It has been our pleasure to serve you.

NCLEX Advice!

After years of nursing school, the one thing everyone dreads is the NCLEX. It can be a daunting task so I have a few pieces of advice for any nursing student preparing for the NCLEX.

First, I would suggest purchasing a book or an online program to study. There are tremendous amount of topics discussed in nursing school. A book or an online program makes the task a bit more manageable because it has a structure. This is different

than picking up your old nursing books and trying to reread chapters. This brings me to my next point; do not try to relearn everything you were taught. It is too much information and you will become overwhelmed. This is an excellent opportunity to reflect upon yourself and acknowledge what specialties or topics you needed some extra help on. These topics are what you should be focusing most of your efforts on. Next, I would take advantage of the NCLEX reviews that SNAP holds at the annual convention. These workshops have useful tips and tools to help you pass your NCLEX on the first try. Finally, trust yourself. It is so important to go with your gut and believe in yourself. Overthinking is something that nursing students are caught doing. Trust in what you believe to be true because it probably is. I wish everyone the best of luck when you sit for your NCLEX!




